ENGLISH MASTER IN INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS PROGRAM INTRODUCTION APPLICABLE FROM ACADEMIC YEAR 2024/2025

This document outlines the requisite components for the completion of the English Master in International Relations Program (MIR Program), as well as the structure of the courses offered within the MIR Program.

The document contains the requirements for completion of the program:

- a. Minimum number of credits to be earned and their sources
- b. Thesis defense
- c. Final exam

Requirements for completion of the program

To complete the program, students must fulfill the following requirements:

- 1. Earn at least 120 credits from the courses listed in the program curriculum.
- 2. Successfully defend their thesis.
- 3. Successfully complete the final examination.

In addition to the aforementioned requirements, the following regulations govern the method and further requirements for obtaining the qualification: the relevant and current legislation, the university's study and examination regulations, as well as other university and faculty study and examination regulations.

There is no language exam requirement for the diploma.

- a) Minimum number of credits to be earned and their sources
 - i. Earning Credits

In the Program curriculum below, the required 120 credits must be obtained from the followings as indicated below:

The subjects serving as sources for the credits are announced each semester in the course schedule. They can be registered for and completed according to the conditions set out in the curriculum and the course schedule.

Compensatory Courses:

Students who obtained an International Relations BA degree issued by a Hungarian higher education institution are exempt from the compensatory courses. All other students are entitled to complete the compensatory courses (30 ECTS in total) as presented in Table 2. throughout the 1st year of the Programme, distributed between the two semesters.

b) Final exam

i. Prerequisites for Final Examinations:

- A minimum of 120 credits must be completed in accordance with the curriculum set forth in the MIR Program.
- The final certificate (absolutorium) must be earned. A final certificate is granted by the higher education institution to students who have fulfilled the academic and examination requirements outlined in the curriculum, in addition to having completed 120 ECTS.
- Registering in the Final Exam through the MODULO system.

ii. Structure of the Final Exam and the Thesis Defense

Upon successful completion of the prerequisites outlined in point i., students will be eligible to take the final examination. The initial phase of the final examination will entail a defense of the thesis, which will be followed, if successful, by the second phase, as delineated herein.

iii. The MA Thesis

Students of the MIR program are bound by the latest Thesis Regulations of the University of Szeged Faculty of Law and Political Sciences which is available on the <u>Faculty's website</u>. The general requirements, as outlined in the Thesis Regulation, are indicated below. For all other requirements, the Thesis Regulation should be consulted.

a) The length of the thesis shall be at least 80,000 characters (spaces included) in Bachelor's and Master's programmes and, subject to the decision of the programme leader, including footnotes and the table of contents. The inner title page, the bibliography, annexes, appendices, pictures, maps and diagrams shall not be included in the length of the thesis.

b) The pages of the thesis shall be numbered consecutively with increasing Arabic numerals beginning with one. Page numbers shall be placed at the top or at the bottom of the pages.

c) On the left-hand side of the pages a margin of 3 cm is required while on all the other sides a 2.5 cm margin shall be left.

d) The thesis paper shall be written in Times New Roman font with 1.5 line spacing. Bold, italic or underlined font types shall only be applied to titles or highlighting. A font size of 12 shall be used for the thesis with the following exceptions: - for (chapter) titles and subtitles the font size shall be 13-15;

- the font size of 10 shall be used for footnotes;
- for titles of pictures, maps, diagrams and tables, the font size shall be 10-12; and
- for internal text of tables and diagrams the font size shall be 8-12.

e) Tables, diagrams, pictures and maps shall be both numbered and titled and a reference to their source shall also be provided. Tables, pictures, maps and diagrams covering a whole page or not fitting into the body of the text shall be placed in the appendix or annex.

f) Annexes or appendices shall be titled and if there are several of them, they shall also be numbered.

Should the thesis fail to meet the requirements stipulated in Section 2.1 a), b) and c), the committee evaluating the thesis shall grade the thesis as unsatisfactory/failing without substantive examination or consideration. Violation of other formal requirements may be considered as a basis for grading the thesis as unsatisfactory/failing depending on their gravity or otherwise taken into account in its assessment.

Once the Thesis has been submitted, the Advisor assesses it in writing and grades the formal aspects of the Student's Thesis Work in NEPTUN as part of the designated course on a 3-tier scale: failed-passed-excellent). In addition, the Program Administration additionally assigns the Thesis to a Reviewer/Opponent, who then prepares a written assessment of the Thesis, evaluating it as to format and content and asking 1 to 3 questions from the student.

In their assessments, Reviewers suggest a grade for the Thesis. The Reviewer's assessment will be sent to the Final Examination Panel (Panel), as the Reviewer is not necessarily one of the 2 or 3 members of the Panel.

iv. Final Exam

- 1. During the Final Examination, the Students shall start with the obligatory Thesis Defense procedure including presentation of their research outcomes and providing answers to the questions asked in the Advisor's assessment. The presentation and the answers are then assessed by the Panel, based on the grade given by the Advisor). If the Thesis Defense is successful, its grade is communicated to the Student on site after a brief consultation of the Panel. *The Defense Grade is the grade given by the Final Examination Panel*.
- 2. If Thesis Defense is unsuccessful, the Students may not continue their Final Examination and are informed to that effect, as the case may be.
- 3. Upon a successful Thesis Defense, the second part of the Final Examination starts. Here, the students are referred to question(s) per each Subject Areas that consist of two.
 - a. International Relations, International Studies, International Economy
 - b. Legal, Political, Institutional and Economic Aspects of the European Union
- 4. The Final Examination shall be considered successful if Students answer the questions pertaining to all the two Subject Areas on a satisfactory level. *The Panel shall assess the answers given per Subject Area.*
- 5. The Final Grade of the Final Examination is the average of the grades of the Thesis Defense and those given on the questions answered in the two Subject Areas (In accordance with the general rules of "rounding up", the average should be calculated up to two decimal digits after the decimal point.
- 6. If one of the Subject Areas produces a Failed assessment based on the Students' answers, all subject Areas will have to be repeated on the Retake Final Examination.

RETAKING THE FINAL EXAMINATION

1. No successful Final Examinations can be retaken to improve the grade or assessment.

2. The Final Examination qualifies as unsuccessful, if the Examination Board assesses the total of the student's answers during the examination in one of the specific Subject Areas as Failed.

3. In this case, the Final Examination (*with both subject areas*) should be retaken in another Final Examination period.

CALCULATING DIPLOMA AVERAGE

Diploma averages for the MA program in International Relations are calculated as the average of the following 2 criteria:

1. the average of all the grades for all the mandatory courses in the curriculum as presented in Table 3. over the course of 2 years – except practices and seminars – and,

2. the result of the Final Examination

Those courses which the students needed to accredit in the form of +30 ECTS compensatory courses based on the curriculum do not account toward this result.
